Weird History: The Curse of The Colonel.

For as long as there have been professional sports, there have been sports curses. So, excited Hanshin Tigers fans ripped the statue from its foundation, carried it to the Ebisu Bridge, then tossed it into the murky depths all while patting themselves on the back for being so clever. Unfortunately for these plucky baseball fans they had just unknowingly awoken the Kentucky Fried Wrath of Colonel Sanders, cursing their beloved baseball team for close to forty years. What would follow was a 38 year title drought, plus an eighteen year losing streak for the Hanshin Tigers during that time. Seeing as it's the month of April, and April Fools' Day was this month, I thought I'd talk to you all about my all-time favorite April Fools' joke. It was the one that Electronic Gaming Monthly magazine pulled in 1992. It had nearly every video gamer bamboozled by making them think that the iconic game "Street Fighter 2" had an unlockable boss character you could obtain. The one in question is known as "Sheng Long." This came about due to a translation error in one of Ryu's quotes. He states, "you must defeat Sheng Long to stand a chance." instead of the intended quote "If you cannot overcome the Rising Dragon Punch, you cannot win!" This inspired the boys over at E.G.M. to take the ball and run with it, publishing a full-on article about how to obtain said Sheng Long. According to the magazine, if a player went through the game's arcade mode as Ryu without taking any damage, then beat the final boss M. Bison without taking any damage, Sheng would appear. He would toss M. Bison off his stage, and proceed to fight Ryu. Also, according to the article, Sheng Long would have the ability to copy other fighters' moves. Well, you can just imagine the surprise, outrage, and pretty much among other things, a little bit of apathy when the hoax was finally revealed in the December '92 issue of E.G.M., citing that Sheng was indeed NOT a character in Street Fighter 2. Sheng would however become Street Fighter lore after this, as even though he hasn't been playable in ANY of the iterations of the Street Fighter franchise, he would still be mentioned as a mentor to Ryu and his training partner, Ken. More than 30 years after this hoax first came about, it still ranks up there as one of the greatest April Fools' jokes of all time, and without a doubt, my all time favorite.
